


Utah recognizes the way to achieve these outcomes is to make resources available to support families in their homes and communities.

CHILD WELFARE FINANCE REFORM: ALIGNING RESOURCES WITH OUTCOMES

long-term vision must drive child welfare finance reform. Over the past decade, we have learned that quality outcomes are most often realized when children and families are engaged with organizations that are invested in their long-term permanency, wellbeing, and safety. Although our IV-E Waiver has given us the opportunity to employ innovative strategies based on research and evidence of what works, the need to broadly align federal resources with desired outcomes still remains.

The following table provides policy recommendations, ideas, and strategies that we believe are worthy of consideration and further analysis in the conversation surrounding federal child welfare finance reform.
